
MARTINO BITTI

'CAMBRIDGE' SONATA No. 11 in F major edited by Michael Talbot and Antonio Frigé



itti's twelve 'Cambridge' sonatas, presented to Cardinal Ottoboni, represent the 'late', galant Bitti, full of lovingly sculpted ornamental detail for the violin but with the same resourceful harmony and perfectly proportioned forms as before. The eleventh sonata. in five movements, is one of the most elaborate in the set. Its highly ornate first movement (A tempo giusto) makes attractive use of syncopation, and the good-humoured second movement (Vivace) contains sly allusions to academic counterpoint. The following two movements resemble, respectively, a sarabanda and a giga, and the piece ends with variations on a minuet theme - in the 1720s a newly fashionable way to close a sonata.
